Prerequisites of The Higher School Certificate

To qualify for the Higher School Certificate, the College must certify that students have satisfactorily completed all coursework and applied themselves adequately.

To meet these requirements, students at Arndell Anglican College must:

- Satisfy NSW Education Standards (NESA) requirements of attendance (at least 85% of the available school days).
- Study a pattern of subjects, which meet the NSW Education Standards (NESA) requirements for eligibility.
- Make a serious attempt at and complete all assessment tasks by the required date.
- Sit and attempt, in a serious way, the Higher School Certificate examinations in sufficient Board determined courses, complying with exam procedures.
- **Meet** all class work obligations, including in-class exercises, homework and practical work.

Additionally, students need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC.

To show they meet the standard students need to:

- achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online reading test and
- achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online writing test and
- achieve Level 3 or 4 in the online numeracy test.

Pattern of Study

To qualify for the Higher School Certificate students must satisfactorily complete a Preliminary Pattern of Study comprising at least 12 units and an HSC pattern of study comprising at least 10 units.

Both patterns must include:

- At least 6 units of Board Developed Courses
- At least two units of a Board Developed Course in English
- At least three courses of two unit value or greater (either Board Developed or Board Endorsed Courses)
- At least four subjects

Work Placement

For those students studying Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses, work placement is a mandatory HSC requirement. For each course, a minimum number of hours is required in the workplace to enable students to practise the skills learnt in the classroom and gain a much deeper understanding of the industry competencies they must achieve.

Records of School Achievement (RoSA)

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) issues the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) to eligible students who leave school before completing the Higher School Certificate (HSC). The RoSA is a cumulative credential, meaning it contains a student's record of academic achievement up until the date they leave school. Students will need to have completed the mandatory requirements for Years 7-10 to be eligible for a RoSA.

Awarding of Grades

Grading is a way of showing a student's level of achievement in a course in a way that can be compared fairly between individual students. A – E grades will be awarded for courses completed in Year 10 and after, up until the time a student receives their HSC result.

The marks from assessments will be used to allocate a grade for each student at the end of the course. The school will submit those grades to the NSW Education Standards (NESA) for moderation and then inclusion on the RoSA.

Satisfactory Course Completion Requirements

To satisfactorily complete a course, students must

- follow the course developed or endorsed by the NSW Education Standards (NESA)
- apply themselves with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the College
- achieve some or all of the course outcomes

Satisfactory completion of courses is judged, in part, by your attendance and level of involvement in class, the assignments, homework etc completed and your level of achievement.

The RoSA (Record of School Achievement) is the usual pre-requisite for entry into programmes of study leading toward the award of the Higher School Certificate and all trade certificated courses in the TAFE system.

Grading In All Subjects

Performance Descriptors are statements that summarise the observable and measurable features of a student's achievement. Performance descriptors have been established to measure five levels of achievement.

- **They do not indicate failure**
- **They are not awarded in a predetermined ratio.**

Please note that Mathematics will be graded differently (A10, A9, B8, B7, C6, C5, D4, D3 or E2) to summarise the student's achievement of Stage 5. Please refer to the Head of Mathematics for further explanation of these grades.

The General Performance Descriptors

Subject teachers design assessment tasks to test knowledge and skills in each subject. The achievements of each student are then matched to the appropriate performance descriptor grade. The choice of a particular grade will be made on the basis of its relationship to the best overall description of the student's achievement at the end of Year 11.

Non-Award in Stage 6

An "N" award may be given to a student in any course of study if they do not satisfactorily complete the course in terms of one or more of the following

- Attendance
- Non-submission of assessable tasks
- Failure to make a reasonable effort
- Failure to achieve minimum course outcomes

Students Rights and Responsibilities in Preliminary Assessments

You have the right to:

- (i) Be informed of the assessment policies of your school.
- (ii) Receive clear guidelines relating to the requirements of each assessment task.
- (iii) Be told in advance of the due date for each assessment task.
- (iv) Query the mark for an individual task at the time it is returned to you.

You have the responsibility to:

- (i) Become familiar with and follow the assessment requirements set out by the College and explained in this booklet.
- (ii) Complete all set tasks on time, or speak the Director of Curriculum 7-12 to apply for an extension as early as possible before the due date. If you are absent or ill during an assessment task please refer to the section Absence or Illness During an Assessment Task.
- (iii) Avoid behaviour which could be considered cheating/malpractice, including plagiarism, and ensure that all assessment work is your own or appropriately acknowledge the contribution of others.
- (iv) Follow up any concerns you have with tasks at the time they are marked and returned. If you have concerns, please follow the appeals process outlined in this document.

Steps Students can take to Manage their Assessment Tasks

- (i) Be aware of due dates published in this booklet and communicated through the Edumate portal.
- (ii) Check your emails daily and take note of instructions provided by your teachers.
- (iii) Keep an up-to-date diary of all assessment activities and other commitments.
- (iv) Be aware of the guidelines outlined in the 'All my own Work' module completed by you before you began your senior studies.
- (v) Use a wall calendar in a public space like your kitchen to record due dates if you want your family to help you remember deadlines.
- (vi) Start tasks early so you can ask for help if you need it.
- (vii) Break tasks into a series of smaller steps and set deadlines for completing each step.
- (viii) Record the sources of information you use as you find them so that acknowledgements do not become a major task at the end.
- (ix) Frequently save and back up any work completed on the computer. The failure of technology is not an acceptable excuse for late submission of work.
- (x) Keep all your earlier drafts and copies of your resources.
- (xi) Keep a copy of any work you submit for marking.

Rules Governing The Submission Of Assessment Tasks

For all tasks, the School will give written indication to students, a minimum of two weeks prior to the due date, concerning the nature of the task, the outcomes to be assessed, the weighting of the task and the marking guidelines to be used.

The following rules apply for the submission of tasks:

- (i) Students must complete and submit each assessment task on or before the due date according to the instructions on the assessment notification.
- (ii) Unless otherwise stated on the assessment notification, all assessments should be submitted by 5pm, unless otherwise stated on the assessment notification. After this time an assessment is considered late unless proper evidence of illness (Medical Certificate) or misadventure is produced. A medical certificate may not be written by a family member and must be presented to the Director of Curriculum 7-12 the first day the student returns to school. Penalty for late submission is 50% for the first day and then zero for any ongoing lateness thereafter.
- (iii) If a mark of zero is awarded, an N warning letter will be sent out and the task must still be completed in order to meet course outcome requirements.
- (iv) The Director of Curriculum 7-12 may elect not to accept an assessment task from a student who repeatedly absents themselves from the college in the days prior to an assessment task due date, or attempts to complete tasks during lesson time, thereby gaining an advantage of extra preparation time.
- (v) When assessment tasks require the use of computer equipment, or when a student chooses to make use of such equipment or other technological equipment, **failure to use technological equipment competently DOES NOT constitute a valid reason for late submission of a task.** Students experiencing hardware issues should report to IT immediately either in person or via helpdesk@arndell.nsw.edu.au. Students should make back-up copies of assessment tasks on memory sticks to allow time to overcome any of technological difficulty that may arise.
- (vi) Oral and practical tasks are often completed in class time over several consecutive class periods. The teacher in charge will arrange the order of presentation. All students MUST be ready to make their presentations on the first period set down for the task.
- (vii) Non serious attempt, frivolous answers or objectionable material (eg – offensive language, racist comments etc) - Parents or Guardians will be informed and a zero mark will be awarded for the section or sections concerned.

Missing a task due to absence

If a student will miss a task due to a pre-organised school or out of school event such as an excursion or sport, the student should submit the task prior to the event OR, if this is not possible, inform their teacher to make an alternative arrangement. **In the case of alternative arrangement, a misadventure application should be lodged.** If a student will miss a task due to an in term-time holiday, they must apply for Principal's approved leave and complete the task prior to departure. **Students are encouraged to communicate with their teacher as soon as they are aware that a holiday will impact and assessment and lodge a misadventure application if needed.**

Absence From or Illness During an Assessment Task and Extension Requests

- A student absent for any task must notify the classroom teacher and/or Head of Department in writing as soon as it is known that the absence will occur or has occurred. It is the student's responsibility to seek out Illness and Misadventure if required. An Illness and Misadventure form (located on the College website) should be completed and sent to the Director of Curriculum 7-12 accompanied by satisfactory evidence (such as a Medical Certificate). Where this happens an alternative date or task will normally be arranged which may be on the first day back at school. If this is not feasible, an estimate mark will be used.
- If the absence is not related to Illness or Misadventure and is known in advance, an Application for Prior Arrangement is required. This should be done as soon as it is known that an assessment task will be missed. The Head of Department will then organise an alternative arrangement for the assessment task and inform the Director of Curriculum 7-12.
- A student applying for Extended Absence or Exemption (Headmaster's approved leave) due to travel, hospitalisation, elite sport etc, it is the responsibility of the student to apply for prior arrangement if they will miss an assessment task. An application for prior arrangement should be lodged in conjunction with the Headmaster's Approved leave form.
- If no satisfactory evidence of illness or other documentation proving misadventure is produced, on the first day back, the process of applying deduction for late submission will be followed.
- A student who is ill or becomes ill during a task should report the matter immediately to the teacher in charge. The Head of Department and the Director of Curriculum 7-12 will discuss the process of an Illness and misadventure claim and communicate alternative arrangements with the student. All Illness and Misadventure claims dealt with on an individual basis and with confidentiality.
- Students with known, long term physical or mental illness may be supported through the Illness and Misadventure process as they seek treatment for their condition.
- If for the reason of approved illness or absence, a student would like to request an extension to a forthcoming task, please complete an illness and misadventure form no less than 3 days prior to the task due date. The Head of Department and/or Director of Curriculum will assess the application and inform the student of the amended due date if an extension is granted.

Malpractice In An Assessment Task

- The NSW Education Standards (NESA) states that 'Cheating or malpractice is dishonest behaviour by a student that gives them an unfair advantage over others.' Malpractice also includes assisting another student to engage in malpractice. All Preliminary HSC students have completed a NSW Education Standards (NESA) course *All My Own Work*. All rules in regard to malpractice were outlined in the 'All my own work' units completed by students.
- Plagiarism (claiming someone else's work or ideas as your own) is considered a serious offence by the NSW Education Standards (NESA). Proved plagiarism could lead to the student receiving zero marks for the entire assessment or the sections where malpractice has occurred.
- In their pamphlet 'HSC Assessments and Submitted Works – Advice to Students' NESA listed the following examples as behaviour considered to be cheating:
 - copying, buying, stealing or borrowing someone else's work in part or in whole, and representing it as your own.
 - using material directly from books, journals, CDs or the internet without acknowledging the source
 - submitting work that contains a large contribution from another person, such as a parent, coach or subject expert, that is not acknowledged

- paying someone to write or prepare material that is associated with a task, such as process diaries, logs and journals

If a teacher finds substantial evidence that a student has engaged in any malpractice associated with an assessment task, the teacher will inform the student that the matter is to be reported to the Head of Department and the Director of Curriculum 7-12. If malpractice is proven, the student would normally receive 0 (zero) for the task.

Students Considered At Risk of Not Satisfactorily Completing Course Requirements

1. Official Written Warning for Non Completion of a Higher School Certificate course

The NSW Education Standards (NESA) requires schools to issue students with two, course-specific official written warnings, prior to a final 'N' determination being made for a course. An 'N' determination will mean that the course will not be listed on the student's Record of Achievement and may result in the student being ineligible for the award of the Higher School Certificate. Please note that a student who does not submit a task at the scheduled time and who has not been granted an extension or given an alternative task by the Director of Curriculum 7-12 will be sent an Official warning letter. The first Official Written Warning Letter is issued by the Head of Department and counter-signed by the Director of Curriculum 7-12 and posted home.

2. College Review

In issuing the second and final subject warning letter, the Director of Curriculum 7-12 will request the student and their parents/guardians attend a College Review. If a student gets to this point they are in serious trouble of not meeting NESA requirements and the Review will be a genuine attempt by the College to prevent the student from failing this course.

3. An "N" Determination

Students who have not complied with the course completion criteria and who have received at least two written warnings can be regarded as not having satisfactorily completed the course at the time of finalising grades. The Headmaster may then apply the 'N' determination.

The Headmaster makes the final decision about a student not satisfactorily completing a course, and a letter of notification will be issued to the student and their parents/guardians. This will result in the student not receiving either a Record of Achievement or a Higher School Certificate in that course.

Appealing Against Assessment Results

Students should note that assessment marks given to tasks are not normally altered. As part of the appeal process, the class teacher and the Head of Department would investigate any indication that a task has produced an unreliable or invalid result across the group. An unexpected result for one particular student does not indicate an unreliable or invalid assessment. Great care is taken in the setting of tasks to see that they are fair, reasonable and clearly measure the outcomes of the syllabus.

To make an appeal regarding an Assessment Task or examination a student must:

- (i) Appeal in writing to the Head of Department within 3 term days of receiving the result for the task clearly stating the grounds for the appeal. The Head of Department will investigate and report back to the student their findings.
- (ii) If unsatisfied, students and their parents or guardians should communicate a request for appeal, in writing to the Director of Curriculum. The appeal will be considered by a panel made up of the Director of Curriculum 7-12, the relevant Head of Department and another executive within 1 week of the date of lodgment of the written appeal. Please note that the Headmaster may elect to be part of that panel.
- (iii) The College will do everything in its power to resolve the matter.

Homework and Assessment Tasks

To complete Preliminary and HSC requirements, students must undertake specific tasks and will be expected to work beyond the normal homework schedule.

It is expected that in their HSC courses, students would work a minimum of 90 minutes per unit per week. Therefore, a student may well be expected to work **18 hours OR more** on their 12 units.

It is highly recommended that students read as widely as possible around their chosen subjects and practice assessment tasks and examination questions. Periods preceding exams will naturally require more study and exam preparation.

Appendix 1

A GLOSSARY OF KEY WORDS

Syllabus outcomes, objectives, performance bands and examination questions have key words that state what students are expected to be able to do. A glossary of key words has been developed by the NSW Education Standards (NESA) to help provide a common language and consistent meaning in the Higher School Certificate documents.

To help develop your understanding of the key words used in the New HSC, the glossary has been included for your reference.

Using the glossary will help you to understand what is expected in responses to examinations and assessment tasks.
